An engaging tale based on an Architectural Engineer in a future North American society under World Government. RFID technology, electroencephalography with neural implants, genetic behavioural engineering and supercomputers have become mainstream making the average person's abilities largely obsolete.

Lance Robert's world is forever changed one day by the discovery of a document, *The Master Plan*, appropriately named as it details how the Illuminist Global Elite are effecting a transition from the old age to a New World Order, or corporate facist utopia.

This forbidden knowledge must mean removal to a labour/re-education camp along with many similar unfortunates. Imprisonment or liquidation are the options in the Global State.

Woven into the protagonist's imprisonment experience are detailed recollections of *The Plan* e.g.: establishment of a faux two-party political system, manipulation of media and entertainment, the paper fiat money system and its monopolisation, creating a universal guilt complex via carbon dioxide and spiritualising the environment, dumbing-down successive generations with useless values-based education programs, and promotion of the homosexual agenda. Above all is the destruction of any and every facet of Christian influence.

Hopefully the reader will be able to grasp realities diametrically opposed to those programmed since birth. The stereotypical antagonists accurately portray what many experience when trying to warn others of the world system's true satanic underbelly.

An important theme is how character's human natures are manipulated by

the State into conformance. Depiction of two of the major people groups is apt: those happy to 'go with the flow' if they are fed and watered, and those who adjust to slavery if wrapped in a comfortable package. A third group is represented, the principled and religious yet lacking the saving knowledge of Christ.

The spiritual life under a New World Order is always at the surface: immediate cruel and unusual punishment for 'terrorist' prisoners as justice, merciless and implacable overseers, and sexual immorality.

Pages 68 and 69 contain a noteworthy summary of America's sharp moral descent preceding the New World Order. If not tragic as accurately reflecting recent history it would be humorous.

Despite the gloomy and dark nature of the all-powerful State, in the end the reader will see how simple and foolish things can be used by God to confound the wise and powerful.

The only major detraction in the book are numerous errata that interrupt the flow.
